Who is Sam Pepper?

Laci Green said, "1 in 6 young women (real life ones, just like the ones in your video) are sexually assaulted, and sadly, videos like these will only further increase those numbers."

Two days later, he posted a "big reveal" video. In this video, he said that the bottom punching video was a set up. He claimed that every "stranger" was asked for consent. He said the whole thing was a social experiment and that men get raped, too. That may be true but he was just trying to distract the audience from the actual problem. After watching the video, some people believed he was telling the truth about having consent. If he had their consent and believes rape is bad, why would he rape someone? Sam Pepper has been forgotten by the YouTube community and almost every social media platform. He has lost many friends and fans.
