In fact, according to an FBI study recording all U.S. terrorism between 1980-2005, it stated that 94 percent of terror attacks were committed by non-Muslims. To put these numbers in perspective, between 2000 and 2010, 293 Americans died because a television or a furniture appliance fell on them. While only 55 people died of terrorism between 2001-2011. In Europe, Islamic based attacks are relatively minuscule as well, the amount of terror attacks in the last 5 years have been only 2 percent.

We also need to realize that every religion has extremists. No matter how hard we try to avoid them, stopping all the people that attack innocent bystanders in the name of their faith is practically inevitable. In fact, in 2011 Anders Breivik murdered 77 people in Norway to express his deep hate against all Muslims as well as multicultural immigrants to promote his idea of a "Christian Europe." In 2013 there were 399 terror attacks by Israeli settlers, these include causing 93 physical injuries to Palestinian civilians and vandalism of several mosques and churches. Even Buddhists terrorists have killed several Muslim civilians in Burma as well as Sri Lanka-they burned down Muslims homes and businesses. Eric Rudolf executed several terror attacks in the name of Christianity- through 1997- 1998, he bombed 2 abortion clinics in Alabama and Georgia. Rudolf also bombed a lesbian bar in Atlanta. However, this man is still portrayed as a brave Christian who was doing "God's work" by the pro christian terror group, 'Army of God.'
